There are still so many secrets yet to be revealed.

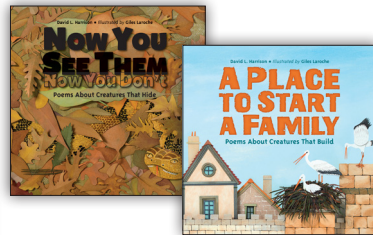

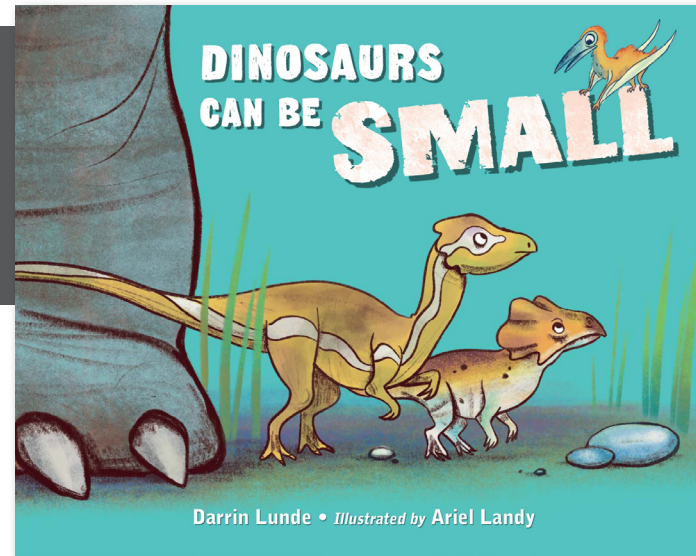

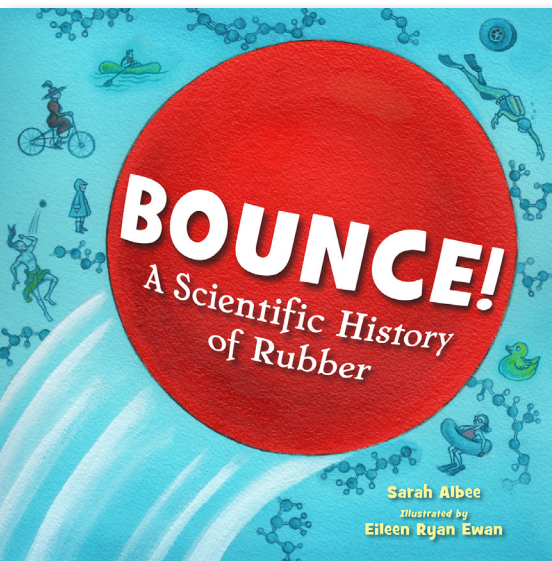
Being big isn't everything.

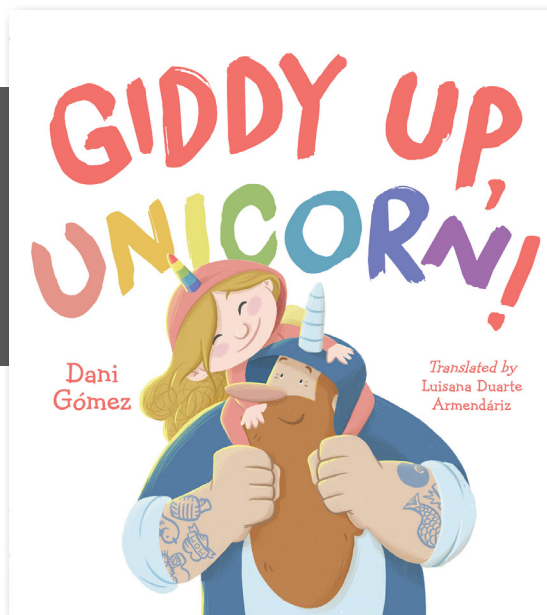


Ever since he was a little chip, Robot knew he was different.

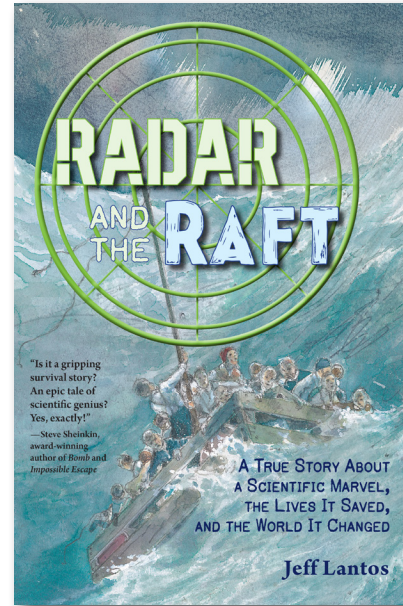
Saving Kenny

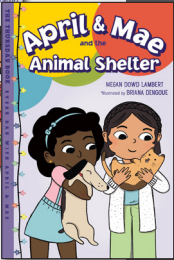
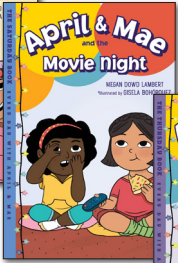

He was nominated for a 2015 Excellence in Theatre Education Award from the Tony Awards and Carnegie Mellon University. He holds a degree from Brown University and has worked producing musicals on Broadway.
